From Mayor Bob Knowlton's Desk:

I hope all is well with the residents of our wonderful Village! I have been the Mayor now for three years. I have enjoyed this job immensely! Just thought I would update you on current events.

The Village recently completed improvements to our water system. We replaced the direct drive pumps at well site #2 on Highway 47 with variable speed pumps. These new pumps will be more efficient than the old ones. We also installed a backup generator and computer assist software that allows the utility department to monitor and control the system remotely. We are also continuing the replacement of all of the water meters in the Village with radio read meters. This will allow our utility staff to drive by a meter and get a reading without even getting out of the truck. This will save considerable time each month. We received Capital Outlay money from the State this year to rehabilitate the tank at well site #2. This will entail painting the inside of the tank. That work will be underway soon.

The Village also received Capital Outlay money for this year to secure the front office at the municipal complex. This will include a new layout for the front desk that will make it safer for our staff when taking payments and such.

The Governing Body spent considerable time this year developing an Intergovernmental Agreement with the Town of Peralta that will dictate responsibilities and rates for providing sewer treatment services. Peralta is in the process of securing funding to begin a sewer collection system. They want to deliver their sewage to our sewer plant for treatment. The Village has limited the amount they can deliver to only their first phase of build-out. Until the Village gets funding to improve the sewage treatment plant, this limitation will remain. We have been trying for several years to get Capital Outlay funding from the State to build a second clarifier and to improve our sludge processing. The NM Environment Department is recommending that we get this funding, but it will be up to the Governor and the Legislature to make it happen.

The Village has asked our Legislators for some money to improve our recreation site. The ball fields are in need of maintenance and the ground cover at the play area needs to be improved for safety reasons. We are hopeful that we will get this funding.

Lastly, I want to try something different this year for interacting with the residents of the Village. I am planning to pitch some horseshoes at the Village courts adjacent to the Fire Department on Wednesday evenings starting about 6:30pm. Anyone who wants to come down to chat about what's going on in the Village is welcome. If you want to pitch some shoes, even better! I can't guarantee I will be able to make every Wednesday, but I will try.

VILLAGE OF BOSQUE FARMS APRIL CLEANUP

The **Bosque Farms Spring Cleanup** will be held on Saturday and Sunday, the following weekends in April:

Sat. & Sun. April 18th & 19th
Sat. & Sun. April 25th & 26th
From 8AM to 4PM

The dumpsters will be located at the **Maintenance Yard next to the Waste Water Treatment Plant on DeSmet Road.**



Due to a limited number of dumpsters, residents will be allowed ONE load per household.

Residents must bring a water bill or utility bill for proof of residency.

NO computers, tires, concrete, ammunition or explosives, batteries, toxic chemicals, paint, asbestos or pesticides will be accepted.

Large and Small appliances such as refrigerators, washers, driers, televisions, toasters, microwaves, furniture, air conditioners, stoves, mattresses, sinks and toilets are accepted. For more information, call the Village Office at 869-2358.

FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

Fire Department wise, this winter has been fairly uneventful although we did have one structure fire that was a total loss. The 911 call came in at 3 o'clock in the morning and when we arrived on scene the structure was already fully involved. Fortunately the residence was not occupied and no one was hurt.

I would like to review the comments made about the cotton that were in the fall news letter:

If your yard in the spring and summer becomes covered in cotton, it would be a good idea to set up a sprinkler or just use a hose and wet your yard down. You need just enough water to mat the cotton and make it lay down. We had an incident where a spark ignited the neighbor's yard and before they could get a garden hose out, the fire had traveled over a 100'.

It is weed burning time again so make sure you go by the Village office and **get a permit**. When burning weeds and yard waste, it is better to burn leaves in small piles and wind rows. If you will keep stirring them they will burn faster and with less smoke. Please be aware of the inversion conditions that trap smoke on the ground which usually happens in the evenings. If you see the smoke from your fire filling up your neighborhood it is time to put the fire out.



Please pick up a "Living with Fire" pamphlet at the Village office when you are getting your burn permit. Rob Barr, the Valencia County Wildland coordinator, worked hard in bringing this information together. The pamphlet shows you ideas on how to live safely with fire and things you can do around your home to protect it during a wild fire event.

MUNICIPAL COURT

Spring is on the way and so it goes that it is time for spring cleaning. Yes, this applies for the court as well.

While violations of local traffic and ordinances are down, the rate for warrants issued has trended upwards. Why is this you may ask? In its simplest terms, it means that those that are found guilty or pled guilty to violations have not complied with the terms of their sentencing. In other words, those who have fines to pay or will be working off fines with community service have not complied.

Judges only have so many tools in their tool box when it comes to compliance. Specifically, if an individual has fines or community service as part of their sentencing, they will be asked to enter into an Agreement to Pay Fines wherein they are given 30 days to complete the sentencing. If they do not, they will be sent an Order to Show Cause notice to appear in court so they can explain why they failed in completing the sentencing. If they do not show up, then a bench warrant is issued for their arrest. Once arrested, they must go through the system once again from arraignment to trial if required. Needless to say, this means more time and expense for the court and the individual.

The average daily cost of detention in New Mexico is over \$64.00 per day. If an individual is picked up on a warrant and taken to the Detention Center on a Friday and not seen by the court until the following Tuesday, the bill for these services can add up to several hundreds of dollars rather quickly. Most of the time warrants are issued because someone failed to pay a ticket or fines of under \$200.00. One can quickly see how this does not make much economic sense from any angle.

To get back to the spring cleaning issue, if there are individuals that have outstanding warrants for the reasons stated herein, these can be taken care of without the need for arrest and detention, but only for a limited amount of time. Those who have outstanding warrants or have not complied with the Agreement to Pay Fines can simply contact the Clerk of the Court and make arrangements to re-enter into an Agreement to Pay Fines and make a payment of at least 20% of the outstanding fines and the warrant will be quashed. This is a one-time only good deal and will not be repeated this year.

Start your own spring cleaning early and clear up any outstanding issues with the court. You'll feel better and so will we and both you and the Village will be money ahead for taking care of these issues.

NO CELL PHONE USAGE IN BOSQUE FARMS WHILE DRIVING

It is against the law to use a cell phone in Bosque Farms **while driving**. Signs are posted within the Village limits. Please help keep our Village and yourself safe by obeying this ordinance. Since school will be out soon, it is important to keep our hands on the steering wheel and our thoughts on the safety of the children and ourselves.

UTILITY DEPARTMENT

We are about 80% through the process of installing radio read water meters in the Village.

The meters will be replaced by utility employees as time permits, so we are asking for your patience during this process.

The radio read water meters transmit data by radio frequency as easily as driving down a street with a handheld meter reader as the reader automatically captures the data.

These meters will enhance customer service by improving meter reading accuracy, eliminating estimated reads and offering leak history/diagnostics by tracking consumption patterns over time.

The meters will also reduce labor costs, minimize reading time and free up meter reading personnel to perform other tasks, improve meter reading safety, reduce service order request for high water bill inquiries and allow bills to be mailed on time.

We are now able to download a report from your radio read water meter that will give us leak information, which will show an intermittent leak or a continuous leak, or no leak at all.

We are excited about the radio read water meters and are confident you will be too.

Consumer Confidence Report for 2014

In the past years we have always mailed the water quality report to our consumers.

This year we will not be mailing out the reports but will be adding a direct link on your May water bills. This link should take you directly to the report on our website. The report will be posted in the regular public places in Bosque Farms and will be available at the Village office. You may also access the report by going directly to our Village website at www.bosquefarmsonm.gov. The water quality report will be available after June 1, 2015.

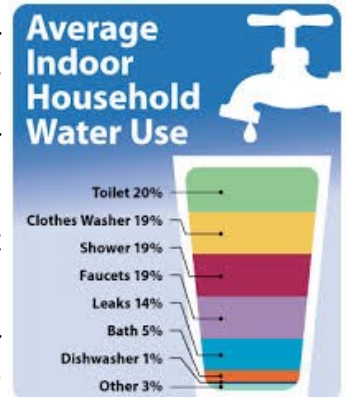
STATUS OF WATER IN NEW MEXICO AND CALL FOR CONSERVATION

Water is New Mexico's most precious and natural resource. New Mexico has experienced several consecutive years of drought and meteorologists predict that it will continue. Water conservation is especially important during times of drought. Addi-

tionally, and arguably more critical, most aquifers in the state are being depleted. Decreasing water levels in aquifers and surface sources can increase the concentration of minerals and contaminants in the drinking water supply.

We at Bosque Farms Water Supply System are committed to providing a safe and consistent supply of water and we ask for your help. There are a lot of simple ways to reduce the amount of water used both inside and outside the home. Please conserve water whenever possible by taking the following steps:



1. Know your water supply provider and follow existing water restrictions.
2. Stop leaks. Toilets are the largest water user inside the home. Over time, toilet flappers can decay or minerals can build up on it. It's usually best to replace the whole rubber flapper—a relatively easy, inexpensive do-it-yourself project that pays for itself quickly. You can get instructions for testing for leaks with dye tabs for free (with free tabs) from the Office of the State Engineer's District Offices or call 1-800-WATERNM.
3. Check outdoor fixtures (swamp coolers, irrigation systems, etc.) for leaks and repair any leaks.
4. Consider turning the swamp cooler off when away from home.
5. Minimize evaporation by watering during the early morning hours, when temperatures are cooler and winds are lighter. Make sure irrigation systems are working properly (and you are not watering the house, sidewalk or street) and use only the minimum amount of water needed by plants.
6. Run water only when using it. Turn water off while brushing teeth, shaving, and/or washing counters.
7. Wash only full loads of laundry. Install a water efficient clothes washer (and save 16 gallons per load).
8. Take 5 minute showers.
9. Flush toilets only when necessary.
10. When upgrading or replacing household fixtures, install low-flow toilets, showerheads, washing machines, and faucets.

NOISY ANIMALS ARE NOBODYS "BEST FRIEND"

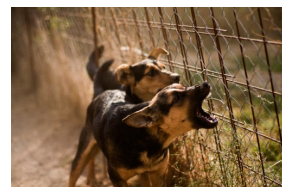

What is good about a barking dog?

- Alerts owners of potential problems.
- Warns owners of a stranger(s) presence.
- Can alert neighbors of intruders when your away.

What is bad about a barking dog(s)?

- One dog barking usually starts other dogs barking.
- Excessive barking is EXTREMELY annoying!
- Noisy animals can create neighborhood problems.



Do you own a watch dog(s) or nuisance dog(s)? Determine whether your dog(s) is a good companion & watchdog or a neighborhood noise nuisance by asking yourself these questions:

Does your dog bark excessively?

- When someone rings your doorbell?
- When another animal comes in view?
- When children are playing outside or your neighbors walk outside their houses at night?

What can you do about your barking dog?

- Determine what is causing the dog(s) to bark.
- Dogs are less inclined to bark if a barrier blocks their view.
- Be alert to stop the barking as soon as it starts.
- Train your dog(s) to respond to a command to be quiet.
- Reward your dog(s) whenever it barks for a watchdog reason.

Breaking A Bad Habit.

- The best cure for a barking habit is prevention early in a dog's life.
- Be consistent & persistent with whatever training you choose to use.
- Be sure to have toys for bored animals.
- Let your dog know when his silence pleases you!

What can you do about a neighbor's barking dog?

- First try to contact the owner and see if a solution can be worked out.
- If this does not work or you are unsure about it, you have the right to file a formal complaint with your Animal Control Officer. Complaint forms may be picked up at the Village office or on line.

BOSQUE FARMS POLICE DEPARTMENT

If you need the assistance of a police officer or need to report a crime, please call the Valencia Regional Emergency Communications Center (DISPATCH) at **865-9130**. **To report a crime in progress or to report an emergency dial "911"**. Otherwise, call 869-2358 and ask for the police department to speak with the police clerk or a supervisor.

2014 was a very busy year for the Bosque Farms Police Department. We handled 2331 calls for service, made 397 arrests (29 of those were for DWI), responded to 118 crashes, wrote 1037 reports and issued 4789 citations. In addition, our troops handled & tagged nearly 1,000 items of evidence.

We have noticed an increase of vehicles traveling on the ditches as a way to avoid the roadways and escape the attention of our officers; consequently we have more arrests on the ditches. Many of those arrests were drug related and often included possession of stolen property. Ditch banks are a favored access to "casing" the rear of homes and backyards. Just a reminder that the ditch banks belong to the Middle Rio Grande Conservancy; the Conservancy maintains the ditch banks for vehicles **only** involved in irrigation activities - they are not for through vehicular traffic. If you see something or someone suspicious, **please** call the dispatch center @ 865-9130.

Spring is here and the ditches are already filled with water. When the weather warms up children are tempted to play in the water, so please educate them on the dangers of playing in or around the ditches. "TURN



AROUND – DON'T DROWN" should be the rule & **REMAND THEM OFTEN!!**

Also with warmer weather come our children; please watch out for the kiddos that are out playing and riding their bikes.

For all those people and businesses that participated in our Toys for Tots program again this last season: THANK YOU! THANK YOU! THANK YOU! We were very fortunate to have such a huge outpouring of generosity this year. Extra-Special Kudos to Lodi's Beads and Dollar General for collecting toys for us and a **huge thank you** to our very generous residents for all the toys and monetary donations. Our **Community Watch Program** continues to do a great job of making our Village safer; our VOLUNTEERS provide a tremendous service to this community. Channel 13 did a short story on our public's display of appreciation. The residents and business owners of "The Farm" certainly make us a very special community. The Bosque Farms Elementary School has also been hosting "Eat lunch with a Cop" for the past few months. Officers are invited to the school to sit and eat terrific food with our school children. TAKE CARE OF YOUR ANIMALS AND OUR COM- MUNITY

Per the Bosque Farms Ordinance 8-3-1, when walking or running your pets, they **MUST ALWAYS BE ON A LEASH**. Take a plastic bag on your walks and pick up after your pets. Your neighbors and others will appreciate your thoughtfulness.
